#### Forty-Third Annual San Jose JACL - Tokutomi Mathematics Contest

The Forty-Third Annual San Jose JACL – Tokutomi Mathematics Contest was held February 19, 2011 at Santa Teresa High School on a brisk Saturday morning with snow topping the valley's hills. The chill invigorated the students and especially contest champion Jeff Korns, a ninth grader from Valley Christian High School in San Jose. The runner-up, Daniel Leonie, and the third place winner, Antonio Gonzalez were both from Milpitas High School.

The contest was restructured to reach out to beginning Algebra 1 high school students in Santa Clara County and consisted of 15 problems done individually and six problems done in pairs. The students saw the solutions in a Power Point presentation explained by Karl Ting from Mission College in Santa Clara. And an inspiring problem to challenge future mathematicians, presented by Dr. Tatiana Shubin from San Jose State University.

#### **Bridging Communities** by Leon Kimura

The Bridging Communities Program came to Japantown
San Jose on April 2nd. Patty Wada - JACL Regional Director,
Hiroshi Shimizu – SF JACL President and Jessica Kyo –
Program intern, brought in high school students of all
ethnic and religious backgrounds to create dialogue,
understanding, preserve history and help to build their
identity. The Issei Memorial Building (IMB) was home base
for the day as the students were welcomed by San Jose JACL
Chapter officers Leon Kimura - Co-President and Neil Kozuma - V.P. of Civil Liberties who provided baked goods
from the successful Japan Relief Bake Sale being held that
same morning at Roy's Station. The students were given
some perspectives on early discrimination and partnerships



with the American Muslim community by Chapter Advisory Council member Jimi Yamaichi who joined Leon in giving some history of the San Jose JACL, Issei Memorial Building and Japantown. All then enjoyed excellent docent guided tours of the Japanese American Museum (including Zahra Billoo – Exec. Dir. SF/Bay Area CAIR) and Japantown with a stop back at the IMB to enjoy lunch, and for some, explore the use of chopsticks!

The Nikkei history and stories are important to tell and retell. Following is an insightful glimpse of the day from one of the 15 youth attendees:

#### A Different Perspective ~ Hamza Nawaz

Not many people truly know of the plight that befell the Japanese in World War II. Yes people know that they were sent to internment camps (despite internment being an inappropriate term for what they had gone through) but how many know what happened to them before and after their "internment"? How many know what they faced during their "internment"? Unless you are a historian who is particularly knowledgeable of the WWII era, most people would not know. And before coming to the Issei Memorial building in San Jose and receiving an amazing tour of the Museum and San Jose Japantown, I didn't know either. But when I got home, I realized that I had been blind before. I learned about how the Japanese came to America, what they did, how they did things, and what discrimination they faced. As a member or the Bridging Communities program, I must say that this tour was very enlightening and that anyone with a desire to learn about Japanese in World War II should take a tour of the Museum, with their charismatic and friendly guides and amazing and beautiful collection of art and artifacts from even before World War I.

#### **Asian Pacific Islander Justice Coalition** by *Neil Kozuma*

The San Jose JACL is one of the four founding members of the twenty-seven member strong Asian Pacific Islander Justice Coalition (APIJC). The mission of APIJC is to advocate for social justice, and seeks to unite and empower the Asian Pacific Islander community.

On March 26, 2011 the SJ JACL participated in the APIJC Retreat to consider issues and concerns to be watched during 2011 including:

- Congresswoman Jackie Speier's Filipino Veterans Fairness Act of 2011 would restore the benefits promised to the Filipinos at the time of the war (WWII) but denied by the Rescission Act of 1946.
- AB 199 (Fiona Ma) calls on middle and high schools to incorporate in their social science lessons discussions pertaining to the role of about 250,000 Filipinos during WWII.
- AB 26 (Tim Donnelly) anti-immigrant legislation introduced December 6, 2010.
- Support Muslim Americans from racial discrimination and hate crimes.
- Monitor Immigration Customs Enforcement's interest in a detention facility in San Jose.
- Secure Communities County of Santa Clara enforcement of detainment of undocumented immigrants.
- Abuse of immigrant workers on H-1B Visas.
- Victim Witness Compensation awareness
- First 5 Funding being taken away by the Legislators
- June Special Election on tax extension
- UC admissions policy affecting communities of color
- Raising awareness on parental involvement in the education system
- 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Vincent Chin
- National economic problems may have anti-Chinese sentiment because of the U.S. debt held by China.
   Public should be educated on the \$14 trillion U.S. debt, China holds \$1 trillion, not a significant amount of the total debt.

#### May 2011 is Asian Pacific American Heritage Month

May is Asian Pacific American Heritage Month - a celebration of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States.

#### **History**

In June 1977, Representatives Frank Horton of New York and Norman Y. Mineta of California introduced a House resolution that called upon the President to proclaim the first ten days of May as Asian/Pacific Heritage Week. The following month, Senators Daniel Inouye and Spark Matsunaga introduced a similar bill in the Senate. Both were passed. On October 5, 1978, President Jimmy Carter signed a joint resolution designating the annual celebration of May as Asian Pacific American Heritage Week.

In May 1990, the holiday was expanded further when President George H. W. Bush designated May to be Asian Pacific American Heritage Month. May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants.

During the month of May please shop, dine, and tour San Jose Japantown, one of the last three remaining Japantowns in the United States.

#### Day of Remembrance, 2011 By Tom Oshidari

On February 20, 2011, San Jose's Nihonmachi Outreach Committee (NOC) held its 31st Annual Day of Remembrance at the San Jose Buddhist Church Annex. This day commemorated the 69th anniversary of the signing of Executive Order 9066, which resulted in the forced removal and incarceration of over 120,000 persons of Japanese ancestry from the west coast of the United States. Jimi Yamaichi, long-time community leader and current curator of the Japanese American Museum of San Jose delivered the Remembrance Speech. He recounted his long, frustrating, but ultimately successful battle to join the carpenters union in San Jose, which previously had denied membership to Asians.

The event's theme was "Fighting Against Fear," and the program's speakers emphasized to the estimated crowd of over 300 the parallels between the anti- Japanese sentiment in the post-Pearl Harbor period and the anti-

immigrant sentiment post 9/11 taken against Muslims and Middle Easterners. Zahra Billoo, Executive Director of the Council on American-Islamic Relations, San Francisco Bay Area, noted that the U.S. Patriot Act is a modern day version of E.O. 9066, creating a sense of fear in specific minority groups. Yasmin Vanya of the South Bay Islamic Association thanked the JACL for being the first organizations to reach out in support of the Muslim community after the 9/11 terror attacks.

Mike Honda took the opportunity to propose that the U.S. should formally apologize for the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882, which singled out Chinese and classified them as permanent aliens ineligible for citizenship and for owning land. Congressman Honda said the Act was the culmination of years of economic scapegoating.

The traditional candlelight ceremonial march through Japantown this year was led by San Jose JACL Co-Presidents, Tom Maruyama and Leon Kimura, and youth members James and Ken Matsumoto.

#### **Installation of Officers and Board Members** by Tom Maruyama

Installation of Officers and Board members for 2011 was conducted by the Honorable My-Le (Jacqueline) Duong [pronounced Xuong] of the California Superior Courts, Santa Clara County.

This was especially symbolic as Judge Duong and her entire family immigrated from Vietnam and settled in San Jose where she attended high school, San Jose State (Magna Cum Laude) then onto UC Davis Law School to receive her J.D.

After graduating she returned to San Jose and after a short period in the private sector, began her career in government at the municipal level.

In 1997 Judge Duong was appointed by Governor Schwarzenegger as the First Vietnamese American in the Northern District as a Superior Court Judge.

Judge Duong continues to champion equality on the bench as well as in the communities in California and across this country.

#### San Jose JACL Basketball Team Bridges Past, Present, and Future by Jon Oshidari

Yes. We are now the guys bringing our kids to watch us at the basketball games. Having grown up playing in the Japanese American Basketball Youth Leagues, it is somewhat surreal to be running on the same courts that we grew up playing on, now as a San Jose JACL sponsored adult team with our children cheering us on!

1946 marked the beginning of the Nisei Athletic Union. Funded in part by money belonging to the defunct Japanese Athletic Union, Akira Komai, Paul Uyemura, Yuichi Hirata and Paul Izumida formed the Nisei Athletic Union in Southern California. By the end of the year, the Northern California Nisei Athletic Union was organized, in part by members of the former JAU and sponsored by The Nichi Bei Times and the JACL. Both leagues began their initial basketball seasons in 1947.

Our San Jose JACL basketball team has been playing together in the Northern California Nisei Athletic Union (NCNAU) since the 2002 season, however, the core of our team has been playing together since our days at

UCLA in the mid 1990's. Through the years, we have played as the San Jose Bombers, the Foster City Flyers, and, for the past four years, the San Jose JACL. Members of our team have included former players for the San Jose CYS, San Jose Ninjas, the San Jose Zebras, the Los Angeles Tigers, the Sacramento Rebels, and other Japanese American Youth League teams from the Central Valley and East Bay. We managed to win the State Title for the Aye Minor division in 2004 and still manage to win some games here and there, even though we now play against some kids who may be half our age!

Despite being a step or two slower than we once were, we enjoy the competition and camaraderie that playing competitive basketball in the NCNAU offers. So long as we can field a roster of healthy bodies, we certainly appreciate the San Jose JACL sponsorship that allows us to continue playing on the same gym floors that we grew up playing on...and pretty soon, many of us will start the cycle again with our kids joining San Jose CYS and running up and down the court, too!

#### **Disaster** Preparedness by *Leon Kimura*

Please take the time to prepare since we never know what the future can bring. Hopefully you have taken initial earthquake precautions like strapping gas water heaters to the wall and anchoring tall bookshelves. The following is an emergency kit guide provided by **72 Hours.org**. In addition, I recommend that you pre-arrange for a contact that lives out of the area that all family members can call to report their whereabouts and status immediately after a disaster. And if you can provide any Japanese translation services in a disaster, please let us know your contact information. Be safe everyone!

#### **Build a Kit**

After a major disaster the usual services we take for granted, such as running water, refrigeration, and telephones, may be unavailable. Experts recommend that you should be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least three days. Store your household disaster kit in an easily accessible location. Put contents in a large, watertight container (e.g. a large plastic garbage can with a lid and wheels) that you can move easily.

Your basic emergency kit should include:

- Water one gallon per person per day
- Food ready to eat or requiring minimal water
- Manual can opener and other cooking supplies
- Plates, utensils and other feeding supplies
- First Aid kit & instructions
- A copy of important documents & phone numbers
- Warm clothes and rain gear for each family member.
- Heavy work gloves
- Disposable camera
- Unscented liquid household bleach and an eyedropper for water purification
- Personal hygiene items including toilet paper, feminine supplies, hand sanitizer and soap
- Plastic sheeting, duct tape and utility knife for covering broken windows
- Tools such as a crowbar, hammer & nails, staple gun, adjustable wrench and bungee cords.
- Blanket or sleeping bag
- Large heavy duty plastic bags and a plastic bucket for waste and sanitation
- Any special-needs items for <u>children</u>, <u>seniors or people with disabilities</u>. Don't forget water and supplies for your <u>pets</u>.
- A component of your disaster kit is your Go-bag. Put the following items together in a backpack or another easy to carry container in case you must evacuate quickly. Prepare one Go-bag for each family member and make sure each has an I.D. tag. You may not be at home when an emergency strikes so keep some additional supplies in your car and at work, considering what you would need for your immediate safety.
- Flashlight
- Radio battery operated
- Batteries
- Whistle
- Dust mask
- Pocket knife

- Emergency cash in small denominations and quarters for phone calls
- Sturdy shoes, a change of clothes, and a warm hat
- Local map
- Some water and food
- Permanent marker, paper and tape
- Photos of family members and pets for re-identification purposes
- List of emergency point-of -contact phone numbers
- List of allergies to any drug (especially antibiotics) or food
- Copy of health insurance and identification cards
- Extra prescription eye glasses, hearing aid or other vital personal items
- Prescription medications and first aid supplies
- Toothbrush and toothpaste
- Extra keys to your house and vehicle

Any special-needs items for <u>children</u>, <u>seniors or people with disabilities</u>. Don't forget to make a Go-bag for your <u>pets</u>. www.72 Hours.org
