National JACL Convention

This year the San Jose JACL is hosting the 2014 National Convention July 19 – 22 at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel.

"We Are America"

The San Jose JACL welcomes you to celebrate the theme of "We Are America" at the 2014 National JACL convention! It will be four full days of charting the course of JACL while enjoying great weather and amenities of the 10th largest city in the nation and surrounding cities! While the convention dates are officially July 9-12, 2014, San Jose has so much to offer that we are happy to have you come early or leave later to enjoy our city!

San Jose is a place of change: from the first Capital of California to the 'Valley of Hearts Delight' which paid homage to the agricultural industry, San Jose has earned it's nickname of 'Capital of Silicon Valley' - the major city in the local high tech industry. The 1940 census reported San Jose's population as 98% white American and it is now a City with pride in diversity. It is home to San Jose Japantown (one of the last three historic Japantowns in the United States), San Jose Taiko (the second taiko group in America), the Japanese American Museum of San Jose, and the San Jose JACL (established in 1923 as the American Loyalty League) located in the landmark Japanese Hospital building. Convention delegates will get their first welcome to San Jose when they fly into the Norman Y. Mineta San Jose International airport. In 1971, Norman Mineta was the first Asian American mayor of a major American city.

The Convention will climax with the San Jose Obon On July 12 and 13. This is a two day obon festival with the traditional Obon odori (dance) on both days. Conventioneers are invited to extend their visit after the convention to fully experience this event. San Jose is proud to host nearly 1200 dancers at their Obon with collegiate taiko performances in the afternoon prior to the festival, along with food and game booths for all ages.

This year's theme of the 2014 JACL Convention is "We Are America" and is a reflection of the diversity within the Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) community and the important role we play in our nation's socioeconomic future. For far too long, AAPI's and other people of color have struggled to gain acceptance as Americans. The 2014 JACL National Convention will focus on raising awareness about diversity and inclusion of communities of color as an integral part of the fabric of American society.

The 2014 National JACL Convention chairperson is **Wayne Tanda** and it will be held at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel conveniently situated minutes from the **Norman Y. Mineta** San Jose International Airport and several mass transit transportation services including the Valley Transit Authority (VTA) Light Rail System and Bus services. 

"Day of Remembrance" by Sharon Uyeda

"Civil Liberties and War: Commemorating the 70th Anniversary of Korematsu v. United States" – San Jose Day of Remembrance



The 34th Annual San Jose Day of Remembrance was held on Sunday, February 16, 2014 at the San Jose Buddhist Church Betsuin. In 1944, the Supreme Court of the United States upheld the constitutionality of the World War II concentration camps for Japanese Americans in the case of Korematsu v. United States. Almost forty years later, Fred Korematsu's conviction was overturned when a legal team led by attorney Dale Minami showed that the U.S. government suppressed evidence in the 1944 case. This year, Dale Minami was a special guest speaker and he related aspects of the case. Joe Yasutake was the remembrance speaker and he shared his personal experience being incarcerated in the Department of Justice's detention center in Crystal City, Texas.

Chapter Board member, James Aki Matsumoto and Reiko Nakayama of NOC read the names of each camp as former incarcerees from the various camps lit candles. A candlelight procession through Japantown followed.

Returning to the Betsuin Annex, everyone took their seats and listened to San Jose Taiko perform. Concluding the evening, Congressman Mike Honda spoke about the importance of protecting civil liberties.


Coincidently, on February 11, Congressman Honda introduced HR 482, which would resolve "that the House of Representatives: (1) recognize the historical significance of February 19, 1942, the date Executive Order 9066 was signed by President Roosevelt, restricting the freedom of Japanese Americans, German Americans, and Italian Americans, and legal resident aliens through required identification cards, travel restrictions, seizure of personal property, and incarceration; and (2) supports the goals of the Japanese American, German American, and Italian American communities in recognizing a National Day of Remembrance to increase public awareness of these events."

The Morris Dailey Auditorium at Tower Hall on the San Jose State University Campus was the location of the January 26th celebration of **Fred Korematsu's** legacy. The theme was focused on undocumented immigrants with a line up of speakers and that tackled the burgeoning question of how to address this issue. Master of Ceremonies, **Lloyd LaQuesta**, ably marshaled the afternoon with a program including Fred's daughter **Karen Korematsu**; Congressman **Mike Honda**; **Bonnie Sugivama**-Director of the LGBT Resource Center at SISII: undocumented students **Miguel**

Sugiyama-Director of the LGBT Resource Center at SJSU; undocumented students **Miguel Santiago** and **Myrna Enriquez**; and Keynote Speaker – Pulitzer Prize Journalist **Jose Antonio Vargas**. We even had **Cesar Chavez's** son joining in the discussion from the audience.

Hanami... By Cindy Sugino

Spring arrived in San Jose with lots of rain that we did not get in the Winter. I am reminded of the childhood song that my neighbors grandmother taught me. 'Haru Ga Kita' (Spring has come), a song that provides a vivid image and welcomes spring as it surrounds the land with flowers and the songs of birds.

With the spring comes the blossoms and more specifically for the Japanese Culture, Cherry Blossoms and the Cherry Blossom Festivals. I found this information on the web and wanted to share some Cherry Blossom history....

"In spring, one of the best-loved symbols of Japan makes a dramatic sweep across the country. **Sakura** (cherry blossoms) bloom usually from the end of March through April in a kind of wave starting in southern Kyushu and working

its way northeast. The viewing phenomenon – also called the **hanami** – has been celebrated for centuries (popular since the Heian Period(794~1185) and is a good example of the Japanese view of beauty in nature. The undeniable beauty of the delicate pink flowers is offset by a sense of melancholy at their alltoo-brief appearance. This is often compared to our own short time spent on the earth. This mixture of feelings is best expressed with food and drink, of course. And so every year, hundreds of thousands of Japanese of all ages gather beneath the pink blooms, sing karaoke, dance and drink. Ironically, one popular hanami spot in Tokyo is the Aoyama Bochi (cemetery). Those resting under the rows of tombstones are almost forgotten as they are sprinkled with falling blossoms."



Wendy Maruyama: Executive Order 9066: The Tag Project

Artist **Wendy Maruyama's** celebrated large-scale sculptural installation honoring 120,000 Japanese-Americans - incarcerated during WWII.

On display till May 24th, 2914 at Japanese American Museum of San Jose, 535 North 5th Street,

Presented in collaboration with ArtObjectGallery and the Japanese American Museum of San Jose (JAMsj), this multivenue exhibition explores the complex story of the Japanese-American internment. This is the fifth presentation of this exhibition which premiered in May 2012 at San Diego State University. The Society of Arts and Crafts in Boston presented the exhibition in the fall of 2012 and has organized the show's traveling schedule to Arizona and Northern California.

In 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066 authorizing the internment of tens of thousands of American citizens and resident aliens of Japanese ancestry. Wendy Maruyama, a third generation Japanese-American and highly regarded educator and artist/furniture maker based in San Diego, has created a compelling body of work examining this period in American history. The exhibition includes three integrated parts: *Executive Order 9066, The Tag Project*, and an exhibition of historical artifacts.

Why is the JACL failing? A Yonsei perspective ... By Jason Yonehiro

As part of the Yonsei generation and a link in Japanese American history, I have taken personal pride in knowing 'where I came from'. Having Japanese and Caucasian ancestors (Hawaiian's call us 'Hapa Haole' or half white) I am consistently asked what ethnicity I am. I proudly say, 'Japanese'. But where does this come from? Did it originate since I read 'Farewell to Manzanar' as a junior in high school and then realized my grandparents had been holding out on me? Maybe. I think being Japanese American in this new century of American citizenship means less of how Japanese and other immigrant ethnicities were subject to horrific racial and cultural persecution and more on celebrating these foundations of support and opportunity given to us by our forefathers and mothers who sacrificed for us all. So why is the foundation of this effort, namely the Japanese American Citizens League diminishing? At a time when JACL's values and vital vignettes are more accepted in society than ever do we see our membership and interest in our organization slowly erode? As a Board member of the San Jose JACL, I feel I have an ability to voice concern and frustration in seeing how this genuine and valuable organization continues to struggle and reinvigorate it's base. But what is the JACL's base? Where are the young members who need to understand what the JACL membership brings and the historical precedence which is the genesis of the organization? If we do not recognize how we engage the next generation of members and what our current membership needs to do in order to attract this new base, I regretfully feel the entire organization may inevitably fail. But where do we start? Let's think of ways where we can work through some of the obstacles I've seen frustrate our local chapter. Let's do away with the Regional, National, local Chapter tiers. Let's create a unified national organization which works cohesively together, unified, and with cause. But first, we need to understand how we engage our next generation of JACL members and why they need to join. If they don't care about their heritage, civil rights, or other value propositions JACL brings to them, it's vital to the vein of JACLs to rethink: why should they?
