San Jose JACL Supports Tsuru for Solidarity

apanese Americans from across the country will be gathering in Washington, D.C. on June 5-7, 2020 for a "National Pilgrimage to Close the Camps." Planning is being led by Tsuru for Solidarity, a nonviolent, direct action project of Japanese American social justice advocates. This is expected to be the largest gathering of Nikkei since World War II.

Organizers plan to bring 125,000 paper cranes, or tsuru, as expressions of solidarity with immigrant and refugee communities that are under attack today. The cranes represent the members of our community who were rounded up and imprisoned in concentration camps during World War II.

To support this effort, the San Jose JACL will be hosting "Fold-Ins" at the Issei Memorial Building at 7pm on the 3rd Wednesday of each month leading up to the event: February 19th, March 18th, April 15th, and May 20th. We will use the time to discuss local outreach efforts while we fold and

appy New Year! We are preparing for the second annual San Jose JACL Manzanar Pilgrimage and we would love for you to join us! The groundbreaking trip in 2019 was extremely successful due to our intergenerational and stimulating conversations between the attendees, reflections from former incarcerees, vulnerable small group discussions, training on how to act as an ally in threatening situations, and information on how to be an advocate for social justice!

This will be a 3-day journey beginning on Friday morning, April 24, 2020 until the evening of Sunday April 26th. This is a rare chance to experience the Japanese American World War II incarceration at Manzanar National Historic Park, the most well-preserved of the 10 major concentration camps.



Take some time to complete an application. Your invested time will reap being selected for a scholarship and provide some financial support. Deadline for submittal is Monday, March 2, 2020.



he United States Census Bureau will begin the 2020 Census count on April 1, 2020.

What is the Census?

Every ten years, as mandated by the Consitution, the federal government gathers data about every person living in the United States. Counting the population living in the US creates a map of who is in America, where they are, and what they do. This data drives policy and decision making for federal and local governments, as well as the private sector.

Why is the Census Important?

Vital Funding for Our Community

The data from the Census will be used to distribute over 600 billion in annual federal funding over the next ten years. Census data lets policy makers and politicians know where resources are needed. In California, Census data is used to determine federal funding allocations for programs that are vital for our communities. The governmentneeds to know where the people are in order to ensure enough money is directed to fund these programs. An undercount will result insufficient funding for these programs.

Making Sure We are Represented

The Census count is used to ensure the fair distribution of pollical power. data is used to draw the boundaries for its districts. Federally, the population count is used to determine the number of seats each state receives within the House of Representatives. California is home to 10 of the hardest counties to count. California is in danger of losing a House seat from the first time in its history. Your participation is crucial.

Keeping Our History Documented

For many communities of color, their stories have not appeared in history books. By participating in the Census it ensures that you, your family, and our community is documented in US history. Your presence here in the US is all that is required for you to be counted and you cannot be excluded because of your race, gender identification, or citizenship.

Your Participation is Important!

Participation in the 2020 Census will not only secure federal funding and political representation, but also document your place in America. You can participate by completing a form online, a paper form through the mail, by telephone, or in person when an enumerator (census taker) comes to your residence. Whichever method is best for you, the Census will start on April 1, 2020.

CAIR 25th Anniversary Gala Dinner


